Presidents Message By Mike Gustafson

Hope you all had a fun-filled July 4th, (with or without power) lots of professional fireworks, BBQ food, etc. It is truly summer time!

I am happy to report that the County Board of Supervisors approved the 2023-24 budget including funding for PML Airport. The next big hurdle will the much anticipated final economic impact report which is due in late 2023.

Just to remind everyone, our next big event is Hot August Nights, on August 5th! This is one of the big events of the year for PMLAA so mark your calendars. The event starts at 5:00 pm at Joe Sobczak's and neighboring hangars on the back taxi-way. It will be a catered event at \$25.00 per person and reservations are required. Because of food costs and preparation issues we will not be accepting walk up attendance. Get your reservations in early. Our very own Joe Sobczak and Rich Crow will be our chefs for the evening. Lastly, if you have a hotrod or exotic car please plan on putting it on display. Contact Gabe Coelho for a parking spot!

We will be collecting school supplies for the local elementary school at our August event. Please bring a packet of pencils, pens, crayons, tablets, binder paper, folders, or other school supplies to donate. Over the last few months the Tuolumne County Grand Jury has been investigating the operations and management of Columbia and PML Airports. Their final report was issued in early July. The short version is that they noted that both airports suffered poor management, poor customer service and sub-par maintenance of the grounds and facilities.

The report also recommends that the two airport Enterprise funds be combined and that all property tax generated by and at each airport be removed from the general fund and added to each airport's operating budget. In this way both airports will be revenue neutral. The report also recommended restarting the Airports Advisory Committee that the BOS disbanded earlier this year.

The report correctly points out that the PML Airport is the main airport for the South County, is part of the gateway to Yosemite National Park and the value of the airport location should be taken into account when discussing the value of the airport to the County at large.

The PML airport also plays a major role for emergency service, both Fire and Air ambulance services. Had the property tax charged for all the planes based at PML been assigned to the PML budget, the airport would be self-sustaining.

Unfortunately the Grand Jury report is not binding, and the County Board of Supervisors are not required to act on the report.

The combination of this report and a positive economic impact report will be part of our arsenal when it comes to future funding discussions with the County. The full report can be found on the County web site.

A Bit of History

Wiley Post's achievements in the cockpit were second to none, yet the Oklahoma native never achieved the legendary status of Charles Lindbergh or <u>Amelia Earhart</u>. One biography of him was even titled "Forgotten Eagle." An oil field roughneck and former criminal—he once served a year in jail for robbery—Post began his aviation career by working as a part-time parachutist and stunt pilot. His dreams of flight nearly ended after a 1926 oil rig accident left him blind in his left eye, but he soldiered on and used the insurance money to buy his first airplane. He won a major Los Angeles to Chicago air race in 1930, and in 1931 he and navigator Harold Gatty used a Lockheed Vega called the "Winnie Mae" to shatter the record for the fastest around-the-world flight.




Unload for Control

What is the stall speed of your airplane? The correct and complete answer is at the end of this article.

ANY speed from 1 knot up to maneuvering speed would not be a wrong answer. But how could that be? On your way to your private pilot license your CFI hammered it into you to maintain airspeed so you don't stall in the traffic pattern.

But in reality, the ONLY parameter you control that can uniquely define the stall is Angle of Attack, or AOA. AOA is a pretty simple concept – it is the angle between the chord line of the wing and the relative wind.



In a fighter, we routinely fly at near zero airspeed, but without stalling. How? Controlling AOA. The F-4 Phantom II would easily depart controlled flight (stall and go out of control or spin) if the pilot allowed the critical angle of attack to be exceeded, yet we taught "rudder rolls" at the Test Pilot School in a nose high attitude with airspeed as low as 60 knots – a LOT slower than the 1-G stall speed of about 130 knots. Every F-4 pilot remembers the training video (well, film, in those days) "Unload for Control!" And,

indeed, the same concept applies to your Cessna 150. If you want to be a true AOA geek, check out <u>https://youtu.be/iZiduQboyow</u>, and you can learn all about the F-4 AOA system and "high alpha" flight characteristics.


A better question to ask about stall, is "what is the stall Angle of Attack?" Turns out in most GA airplanes it is somewhere around 15 degrees and is determined by the design of the airfoil and wing shape. It is also adversely influenced (reduced) by contamination such as frost or ice on the wing. But don't confuse "stall" with "lift." Angle of attack is one of the two major components of lift, the other is airspeed. In simple language, you can always prevent a stall by controlling AOA, but you also need airspeed to produce enough lift to keep flying.

OK, your next question, then, might be "how do I know my AOA." Unfortunately, in most airplanes, you don't. Back in 2016, the FAA implemented a program called NORSEE, or Non Required Safety Enhancing Equipment. NORSEE greatly streamlined the process of adding certain equipment to GA airplanes, and among that equipment is the AOA indicator. Learn more about AOA and consider installing an AOA indicator system to your airplane.

If you don't have an AOA indicator, maintaining airspeed and proficiency in practicing stalls is crucial. Be sure your CFI has you perform stalls on your next Flight Review. Get to know the sounds, sights, and feel of your airplane at high AOA. In most airplanes, you can sense the AOA as you approach a stall, including accelerated stalls. Meanwhile, FLY SAFE and UNLOAD FOR CONTROL!

So, what is the stall speed of your airplane? <u>Answer</u>: not enough information given! The critical angle of attack defines the stall, and in level flight that is a function of weight, flap configuration, load factor AND airspeed. But if you really want to know, **VSTALL** = $\sqrt{2W \rho SCL max}$. The stall speed equation is used to calculate the minimum speed at which an aircraft can maintain level flight without stalling where VSTALL is the stall speed, W is the weight of the aircraft, ρ is the air density, S is the wing area, and CLmax is the maximum lift coefficient. There is also a load factor formula for calculating stall speed when the aircraft is banked.
