Jack Frost

If you are flying, Jack is NOT your friend! This morning, I went out to my truck only to find a thin layer of frost on the windshield. Had this been my airplane, parked out on the ramp overnight, could I fly?

Well, not until the frost was dealt with. Frost on the windows would affect visibility. Even more critical, frost on the wings or flight control surfaces reduces lift, possibly resulting in a crash on takeoff.



According to the NTSB, frost the size of a grain of salt, distributed as sparsely as one per square centimeter over a wing's upper surface, can destroy enough lift to prevent a plane from taking off. It's a double whammy: less lift, and a heavier airplane due to the frost itself.

Polishing the frost until smooth used to be a legally permitted way of handling the problem. The regs have changed, because a very small amount of frost, polished or not, can seriously affect your aircraft's performance. It must be removed! POLISHING THE FROST IS NO LONGER PERMITTED.

So, you flew to Columbia last night for a big night on the town, parked in transient, and had a romantic night at the Fallon Hotel, an authentically restored 19th-century country inn. You got up bright and early, had a hearty breakfast at Mandy's and went to your plane only to find the wings covered with frost. What to do?

First and foremost, don't assume a small layer of frost is no big deal and just take off. Before E45 I had a tiedown at Columbia and encountered this situation numerous times. One option, on a sunny day, is to position your plane so the sun is shining on top of the wings. Even if the temperature is below freezing, the radiant heat from the sun will start to melt the frost. In my winter flyaway kit I keep several cans of Prestone Windshield De-Icer (available at your friendly local NAPA Pine Mountain Auto store for about \$7 a can). Depending on how much frost you have on your airplane it could take several cans to completely de-ice it, and it claims to be harmless to car finishes. Hopefully that applies to airplane finishes as well. But take some consolation in the fact that it can cost upwards of \$13,000 to de-ice my little 737 on a snowy day in Denver.

So, why the heck is there frost on my plane when it didn't even get below 32 degrees last night? The answer: black body radiation. Frost that forms due to freezing of liquid water is best referred to as frozen dew. Initially, both the dewpoint and temperature are above freezing when dew forms. Longwave radiational cooling gradually lowers the temperature to at or below freezing during the night. Ever notice how much colder it feels on a clear night than on a cloudy night? Although the air temperature may not get below freezing, an exposed surface can radiate enough heat on a dark night (and we have plenty of those around here) to cause the surface to cool below ambient and cause dew to freeze on your plane.
